Session 1: Critical care

Maternal critical care - Dr Katie Lake, Glasgow

Session 3: Orthopaedics in the elderly

Update in management of fractured neck of femur – Dr Rachel Kearns, Glasgow

- 1. To recognise the importance of the Scottish Hip Fracture Audit in reducing variation in care, improving patient safety and benchmarking standards.
- 2. To be up to date with the evidence base behind the use of nerve blocks in patients with hip fracture.
- 3. To understand the need to expedite surgery where possible, the potential barriers to this, and the situations where it is appropriate to delay surgery to allow correction of remediable, serious abnormalities.

Frailty & vulnerability in the elderly population – *Dr Hazel Miller, Consultant Physician in Geriatric Medicine, Glasgow*

- 1. To understand the technical meaning of the term Frailty.
- 2. To gain knowledge of the different models used to conceptualise Frailty.
- 3. To gain insight into how assessing a patient's Frailty status can aid clinical management.

- 1. Strong local processes drive change.
